
At this time I would like to thank Charlie Finny for his dedication and tenacity in the task the chapter presented him with, Charlie you have the chapters and my personal Thank You!

CHIEF BLACKHAWK CHAPTER, AMCA REVISED BYLAWS OF THE CHIEF BLACKHAWK CHAPTER, THE ANTIQUE MOTORCYCLE CLUB OF AMERICA, INC.

There has been some misinformation circulating about the change in CBH bylaws. Here are the current bylaws. In red is what was omitted everything else is unchanged from 9/20/99.

Section 1. NAME

The name of this Chapter shall be the CHIEF BLACKHAWK CHAPTER of the ANTIQUE MOTORCYCLE CLUB OF AMERICA, INC.

Section 2. PURPOSE

The purpose of this Chapter is to preserve, restore, and display motorcycles, motorscooters and powered cycles that conform to the rules, regulations and by-laws of the Antique Motorcycle Club of America, Inc.

Section 2A A primary function of the Chief Blackhawk Chapter is to hold an annual Nation AMCA Meet, in accordance with AMCA rules and schedules.

Section 3. MEMBERSHIP

Each member of the Chief Blackhawk Chapter MUST be a member in good standing of the Antique Motorcycle Club of America, Inc. Chief Blackhawk Chapter members are expected to participate in chapter activities. (and to be available to assist with the annual Chief Blackhawk National Meet.

Section 4. MEETINGS

The Chief Blackhawk Chapter will hold regular meetings on the first Tuesday of each month to plan and schedule the annual AMCA Meet and other chapter activities. The October meeting is specifically used to elect officers for the following year. Current chapter officers and directors will determine meeting time and place. Any changes in meeting time or location will be communicated to members at least 1 week prior to the next scheduled meeting. In addition, Board Meetings (of the officers and directors) may be called as needed to review chapter bylaws and other matters.

Section 5. OFFICERS

Chapter officers will be elected from the membership and shall be members in good standing. Positions to be occupied are President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer. Officers shall be elected for a one-year term and may serve successive terms. In addition, there will be 5 Directors elected from the membership. Directors will be elected for 2 year terms which are staggered so that 3 directors will be elected in one year, and 2 directors the following year. The chapter member designated to handle Vendor Registration will also sit in on board meetings, as a non-voting member.

Section 6. NEWSLETTER

A newsletter will be published twice a year, or as deemed appropriate by the newsletter editor. Newsletters are to be sent to all Chapter members in good standing and to others as specified by the Antique Motorcycle Club of America. Copies shall be available to other chapters on an exchange basis. The newsletter editor is a voluntary position, selected from among chapter members in good standing.

Section 7.FINANCES

The Chapter shall be operated as a non-profit organization. Annual dues are \$6.00. Dues amount may be revised by a majority vote of members at a general business meeting,

Section 8.AMENDMENTS

Amendments to these bylaws may be made at a general business meeting. Any member in good standing may propose an amendment so long as the amendment is consistent with the policies and bylaws of the Antique Motorcycle Club of America, Inc. In addition, the Board of Directors may propose amendments. Proposed amendments will be adopted by a simple majority of members present at a general business meeting.

Bylaws amended July 10, 2011.

DAVENPORT, IOWA MEET WAS TREMENDOUS

When Rich Schultz, the president and guiding light of the Chief Blackhawk Chapter at Davenport, Iowa, asked me to come out there for the first national meet our club has ever had in Davenport, I agreed I would. And am I glad!!!!!

The date was September 30 - October 1, and the place was Davenport City Fair Grounds.

I had to go on three different aircrafts to get there, but it was well worth the fifteen hundred mile trip from Florida.

Saturday a.m. I went out to the Fair Grounds and beheld a sight to gladden the heart of any old-time motorcycle enthusiast. The portion of the Davenport City Fair Grounds set aside for our meet couldn't have been better! It was adjacent to the race track, which we were free to use, and there was ample grass area for parking and riding around—as well as numerous driveways and roadways to ride on—surely an ideal set—up for the antique and veteran motorcycle riders. And—in case of rain, one of the immense Fair Ground buildings was open to us—big enough to bring all our bikes indoors if the rain had hit us. However, the weather was perfect for the meet and the only time we were indoors was when the lunches were served to us by the ladies of the Blackhawk Chapter—yes—free!!

It was real fun to sit on the grass in the sun, eating a picnic lunch, and see beautiful antique bikes parked all around us—and hear the pop and chuff of some of the "oldies" as well as the throaty purr of some of the Fours as their owners would—apparently—rather ride than eat.

Because Rich Schultz and his committee were on the ball, there was a quiet but capable looking police officer watching with sharp eyes the whole picture and as the day wore on, I noticed that he wasn't so serious—but had kind of a grin on his face as he had finally sized us up as a real bunch of family people just having a ball with the antique motorcycles.

SIXTEEN BRANDS REPRESENTED

To give you an idea what a pretty sight it was, there were sixteen different brands of antique motorcycles parked or running around the premises. They were as follows: Indian, Harley-Davidson, Yale, Arrow, M & M, Ariel, Matchless, Cotton, MV Augusta, Triumph, BSA, Excelsior, Servicycle, Evans, ABC, and a P & M. It was a real thrill and very, very interesting to walk among all these different brands of antique motorcycles and see some of the beautiful restorations. We must tell you that among the most beautiful restorations there were two Indian Fours owned and restored by Rich Schultz himself and a beautiful black Indian Four owned by Neil Dawes--the same one

that got first at Medina. And you could not possibly walk by the beautiful 1914 Yale, and 1937 Indian Chief restored by Howard Hielman of Indianapolis, or the really superb 1929 Indian Four owned by Paul Pearce of Oxford, Michigan.

There were two distinctly different or unusual machines there, which were positively one-of-a-kind. First, there was the midget Indian Four brought by Bob Deering. There is a picture of it herewith. And second, there was a beautiful big Indian Four with a set of trainer wheels on it which were retractable, brought by Ray Harvey. There is also a picture of that machine herewith.

GOT SOME RIDES ON OTHER FOLK'S MOTORCYCLES

Having come over fifteen hundred miles on the airlines to get out here and take the pictures and write the story for the meet I was in luck-got a few rides, and the first ride was on the 1912 Twin cylinder Marsh-Metz Twin, unrestored, and owned by Rich Schultz. It was quite a thrill to ride this old machine around the grounds. Next, I had a ride on the Excelsior Twin owned by David McClean of Wilton, Iowa. Later in the day I had a ride on the 1928 Indian Four owned by Paul Pearce. I had to chuckle when I rode the Four, realizing that in the year 1928-when the machines was manufactured-I was advertising manager at the Indian factory. Art Sigal, our president, was up to his usual speed--riding anybody's motorcycle he could use. Art sure loves to ride motorcycles!

There was quite a flea market which occupied almost everyone's attention, at least once around the grounds.

At this point I want to mention the sign which was unmistakeably prominently posted at the gate to the Fair Grounds. It was a large four-foot reproduction of the AMC Emblem--the wheel with the wings on it. Inasmuch as I personally designed this emblem back in 1954, I got quite a kick out of seeing that the Chief Blackhawk Chapter had made a large reproduction of it so that we antique buffs would know which gate to go in. It was a beautiful thing and the club should be commended for it.

Everyone had a perfectly wonderful time at the grounds in the afternoon and when it came time for the banquet, which was held in a very fine downtown hotel, we counted eighty-three at our dinner.

Our president, Art Sigal, had journeyed all the way from Pennsylvania out here and he officiated at the dinner, and prevailed upon me to exhibit my color slides of various makes of old motorcycles which I had restored. Some of the slides went through upside down and caused considerable mirth but in each case I was able to rectify it.

Sunday morning everyone was out at the Fair Grounds early looking forward to another good time. The morning fairly flew, and before we knew it we heard the loud speaker announcement that all machines were to go to the judging area. As soon as possible I counted the machines in the judging area and there were fifty-three

beautiful antique motorcycles in there. This presented a tremendous job for the judges who were Earl Chalfant, James Lucas, and Rich Schultz. However, they succeeded in completing the judging in less than an hour, and that included every machine judged making a complete lap around the track.
